## Q & A on Spiritual Matters

Recently Stan was talking with Daniel and the question came up from an Old Testament reading, "Why do you think God makes such an issue of touching something or someone that has died, so that they are unclean until evening (Lev 11:24-40) Since the Bible does not explain the reason for this, Stan and Daniel speculated on the question, suggesting some possible answers:

A1. So that we will appreciate life. Having to stay outside the camp was a negative thing. Being detached and separated from the community until sundown may help a person to see how valuable life is. Faced with such a consequence, we would gain an appreciating for life and all the good things that comes with it.

A2. Foreshadows New Testament distinctions between life and death. To illustrate, "death-ness" causes a separation between the deceased and those still alive. A person having to stay outside the camp would experience a sampling of the separation that takes place between people when they die. (Praise God that Jesus Christ has nullified the power of death over the believer.)

A3. It is a sign of difference from other nations and "gods." Why does a group wear red shirt with a certain logo on it? To say that we are us, and we are not them. Codes of conduct such as this say we are different from others. In the case of the Israelites it is to say we belong to YHWH and not to other "gods" in the regions around them that revel in death.
